President's Column

The Winding Journey to Becoming a Psychiatrist: Overcoming Barriers

The path to becoming a psychiatrist is often anything but straightforward. For many aspiring psychiatrists, the journey is filled with obstacles that can be both daunting and transformative. As a new residency training director, I now have the privilege of reviewing over 1,000 personal statements from individuals who are desperately trying to become psychiatrists in the U.S. This experience has been profoundly humbling. Putting myself in their shoes, I am struck by the determination and resilience that many applicants display. Their narratives reveal not only a commitment to the field but also the personal struggles and sacrifices they have made along the way. Each story serves as an example of the passion that drives these individuals to pursue a career in psychiatry, often in the face of significant adversity. As a professional society, we need to recognize their strengths and celebrate the rich perspectives they can bring to our field and to the MPS.

Many personal statements that I've read describe the extra work and drive needed for some students who come from U.S. families and abroad where they are the first to complete college and medical school, had fewer opportunities for funding school, overcame challenging life experiences, and were often marginalized. For IMGs, some from war-torn countries or regions plagued by violence, poverty, or instability, they may have had experiences of fleeing their home and culture, overcoming trauma, and adjusting to a new place and a new life. They must find a way to fund their education, acquire credential verification, prepare for

language proficiency tests, go through an often lengthy application processes for residency spots, and sometimes even repeat already completed training.

The COVID-19 pandemic also significantly disrupted education and training for medical students, including those from the U.S. and abroad. Shutdowns affected clinical rotations and hands-on learning opportunities, hindering the practical experience essential for developing clinical skills and often delaying graduation. As medical education pivoted to virtual formats, many students faced challenges in acquiring the necessary competencies to excel in their future roles. When everything was virtual, they may also have had fewer opportunities to interact with mentors, professional and personal supports. The emotional toll of the pandemic, combined with the uncertainty of the residency application process, further complicated the journeys of aspiring psychiatrists.

Securing a residency position in psychiatry is a competitive process and has become even more so recently. The residency match system traditionally favors those with U.S. medical degrees who come from affluent families. This support allows these students to spend time doing volunteer work and research, rather than needing that extra time to pay for school. This leaves many talented students feeling marginalized, often trying over and over for years to be recognized, each passing year becoming more invisible. They must often go the extra mile participating in observerships, networking, and gaining U.S. clinical experience to bolster their applications. Resilience becomes a defining trait for those navigating this

complex path. The ability to adapt, learn from setbacks, and maintain a focus on long-term goals is essential. But many emerge from their experiences not only as competent physicians but also as empathic physicians who bring valuable perspectives to the field of psychiatry.

As the United States becomes increasingly diverse, it is essential that our psychiatric workforce reflects this diversity. A broad range of cultural perspectives enriches the practice of psychiatry and enhances the quality of care provided to patients from varied backgrounds. The experiences of underrepresented graduates, particularly those who come from different cultural contexts or have faced adversity, are invaluable in creating a more inclusive and effective mental health system. A diverse pool of psychiatrists can better understand and address the unique needs of a multifaceted patient population, ultimately improving outcomes in mental health care. But we have to intentionally seek them out for training, work, and our professional organizations.

The importance of support networks cannot be overstated. Community support, mentorship from experienced psychiatrists, and participation in organizations that advocate for psychiatrists like MPS can make a significant difference. As we focus on increasing interest and securing new membership from residents and early-career psychiatrists (ECPs) in the MPS, it is vital to keep in mind the diversity and unique needs of all those entering our field. Our events and initiatives should be designed to be welcoming and accessible; provide a sense of belonging for diverse trainees and ECPs.

As the mental health landscape continues to evolve, the MPS must foster an environment that values the experiences of all psychiatrists and medical graduates. I'd like to begin by asking each MPS committee to consider what they would like to do to increase diversity within our organization. Although this is something we do each year, I'd like for us to focus on how to specifically encourage diverse trainees and ECP's to join us. I'd like to challenge each committee to find a way they can uniquely contribute to this MPS goal. One project I'd like to call attention to as an example is the wonderful speaker series that Dr. Vani Rao has so successfully added to our Community-Diversity Coalition meetings. Please consider coming to the next one: "The Color of Wellness" by Dr. Farha Abbasi on Thursday, 11/21/24 at 6:15 pm via Zoom. If you would like to attend, please email Jora for the meeting link.

By creating an inclusive environment, we can encourage more individuals from various backgrounds to engage with our organization, share their experiences, and contribute to the richness of our MPS community.

October 6 MPS Committee Chair Meeting Highlights

Attendees introduced themselves and talked about their committees' activities:

Community Psychiatry & Diversity is pleased to report that they have had several new members join their committee over the past year. They have brought in numerous speakers which has helped to revitalize the Committee and encourage new ideas. They are working to increase collaboration and advocacy with organizations within the state. The Committee developed an award in honor of Dr. Wonodi – and applications are now open for the cash prize, which will be awarded in 2025.

Legislative finalized the annual MOU review with Washington Psychiatric Society that outlines how we will coordinate the voice of psychiatry with the General Assembly and pay for representation by Harris Jones Malone. Several issues of interest to psychiatry were prominent in 2024 and MPS is working before the next session to submit an amendment for the newly passed AOT bill pertaining to gun ownership. A newly designed LAC Board will be available to Committee members this year – which will have increased security and enhanced features.

Editorial Advisory Board publishes two or three issues of *The Maryland Psychiatrist* per year and welcomes articles submissions from committees, members, and others. The next issue will be out this fall. In response to the survey question about what topics are of interest, members requested personal stories, interviews with psychiatrists, case studies and clinical services at institutions.

Program & Continuing Medical Education is holding virtual programs based on member preferences from the survey. A psychopharmacology update is planned for November. Depending on the topic, MPS will consider including psychologists and other physicians among attendees. When possible, junior researchers are being asked to present to assist early career members in their career path. An interview with Dr. Treisman was held in September, which was held in person. A joint CME with MRCAPP was held in May, which focused on college mental health. The costs of accreditation remain high – even with virtual events. However, the Committee still feels as though free, or reduced cost CMEs are valuable to MPS members.

Ethics is now working with a new APA procedure. To improve consistency of how APA Principles of Ethics are applied across the country, complaints against members are now considered by the APA committee, which will forward them for investigation to the District Branch where the member belongs if warranted. The committee is considering a CME in the winter for 2025 on dual agency and the physician rehabilitation program/procedures.

MPPAC sent out a large scale, paper solicitation in May. It was sent to members, non-members and WPS members with a Maryland address. Dr. Herman is nearing the end of his 5-

year term and urged those in attendance to consider a contribution to the PAC, whose main purpose is to solicit contributions from Maryland psychiatrists and purchase tickets to legislative fundraisers/send contributions to legislators.

Subspecialty is the newest MPS Committee, and they are still getting organized and defining their goals and objectives. They are interested in getting more specialties involved. The Committee is entertaining the idea of hosting an "Ask the Experts" virtual event, and participating in the upcoming MPS career and practice fair.

Dr. Balis then reviewed the role of committee chairs and the MPS <u>Vision, Mission & Values</u>. She noted the continuing <u>MPS Strategic Priorities</u> and the 2024 MPS member survey results and asked how the organization can continue to work toward the priorities while also responding to the survey input.

- Hold an MPS "community day" where members join together once a year to address a need via an event or activity planned by the MPS.
- Podcast interview series featuring psychiatrists.
- Expand the career fair to include psychiatrists in interesting roles who share their experience with attendees.
- Reach out to a larger group of members to involve them in grass roots lobbying, especially when their legislative priorities are at stake.
- Hold 1-2 general membership meetings annually where members can hear quick committee updates and discuss 1-2 topics. Potentially at the end of a Council meeting.
- Collaborate with local organizations who share common goals
- Organize MPS teams for local walks/runs for NAMI, Suicide awareness, etc.
- Can we work more closely with the psychologists, social workers, etc. to cross-promote meetings, etc.?
- Look for ways to increase input from younger members on the MPS survey
- Hold more networking events, including an annual diversity focused CME meeting
- Highlight the work of MPS Committees in MPS News, etc.
- Host short, lunchtime CME meetings

Dr. Balis then reviewed MPS Goals for Addressing Structural Racism and Inclusion and asked each chair to revisit with their committee the initial goals that it set and either affirm or update them. The website will be updated, including the current chairs. This is part of the continuing process of MPS examining its practices and addressing structural racism as an organization. If committees have already accomplished what they set out to do, please think of ways to expand on that or branch out into new areas.

Lastly, she asked how the Executive Committee can support the work of the MPS chairs and committees.

Maryland News

Maryland Behavioral Health Workforce Assessment Report

Last month the Maryland Behavioral Health Workforce
Assessment Report was just submitted to the Maryland
General Assembly pursuant to legislation developed and
passed in 2023. SB 283/HB 418 (2023) established the
Maryland Behavioral Health Workforce Investment Fund and
required completion of this report to inform establishment
of the Fund. Section 1 of the report provides a landscape
analysis of the current behavioral health workforce in
Maryland. Section 2 estimates the extent of the workforce
shortage and Section 3 examines the supply of behavioral
health talent produced by Maryland colleges and
universities since 2014.

The second half of the report draws on the findings from quantitative research and input from over 150 frontline professionals, employers, policy leaders, and educators through semi-structured interviews and regional input sessions to recommend a framework for statewide action. Section 4 includes suggested core values – equity, collaboration, and outcomes – and six recommended strategies to address the workforce shortage. Section 5 lays out the recommended size, funding structure, and initial programs of the Behavioral Health Workforce Investment Fund, while Section 6 reviews key implementation considerations for setting up and administering the Fund. The six recommended strategies for an overarching behavioral health workforce initiative in Maryland include:

- 1. Provide competitive compensation
- 2. Increase awareness of behavioral health careers
- 3. Support paid education and training
- 4. Promote timely and effective licensing
- 5. Invest in job quality
- 6. Expand the impact of the current workforce

Proposed Extension of Telemedicine Flexibilities

The Drug Enforcement Administration has filed a rule for a "Third Temporary Extension of COVID-19 Telemedicine Flexibilities for Prescription of Controlled Medications" with the Office of Management and Budget. While the rule is not yet finalized, we are monitoring the situation and will share more information as it becomes available. The current extension is set to expire **December 31**.READ MORE

Training and Technical Assistance Center

The <u>ESMI TTA</u> Center is a new national training and technical assistance center funded by SAMHSA to address early serious mental illness (ESMI). The ESMI TTA Center provides education, training, and technical assistance on evidence-based, evidence-informed, promising practices related to the identification, assessment, and treatment of ESMI.

New Federal Rule Strengthens Mental Health Parity

The Biden administration recently issued <u>new rules</u> to provide additional clarity and help prevent health insurance companies from continuing to routinely violate the Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act. The law, which was enacted in 2008, requires health insurers to treat benefits for mental health and substance-use disorders similarly to how they treat medical and surgical benefits.

The 2008 law requires, in part, that health insurers not impose additional or more restrictive rules on coverage for mental health or substance-use disorder treatments in similar categories—for example, by requiring prior authorizations or copays for mental health or substance abuse treatments where the requirements do not exist for medical or surgical conditions.

The new rules clarify and emphasize the existing provisions of the law, while also requiring the collection of data and analysis to ensure compliance. They also prohibit the use of biased methods that make it harder for patients to access mental health or substance-use disorder treatment and enforce the ending of the opt-out phase of the law. APA October BOT Meeting Highlights

Report from the CEO Dr. Wills

Marketa Wills, APA CEO, has been focused on understanding the roles of various components and individuals in leadership. She is planning a new version of the previous business model to address revenue deficits, spending costs, and possible staff position revisions or cutbacks. Some important updates she provided include:

- Advocating for health equity in mental health care and an increase in funding for graduate medical education (GME) in psychiatry.
- Ongoing discussions on legislation regarding prior authorization for psychiatric care.
- Integrate primary care and behavioral health, support telehealth and safety planning, and encourage the use of electroconvulsive therapy (ECT) in ambulatory care settings.

Report from the Budget Committee/ Treasurer/Climate Change Committee

Concerns regarding revenue streams, operating costs, and climate change were discussed in detail. The budget deficit was examined, and insights from the Budget and Finance Committee were relayed to the BOT. The Treasurer proposed appointing a committee to focus on cost containment and revenue-generating strategies. The idea was to stay congruent with our strategic priorities.

CLIMATE CORNER

Please see October's issue for a run-down on the importance of voting and list of Maryland's federal candidates and their environmental position. Environmental problems like climate change, air pollution, and plastics pollution require systemic solutions, so voting for candidates who understand the issues is of critical importance. You can identify your local candidates by county here and search for their campaign websites to identify their positions.

This month's column will highlight new studies about plastics. There are now two human studies proving the presence of micro- and nanoplastics (MNPs) in the brain. An autopsy study published in JAMA found microplastics in the olfactory bulb of 8/15 decedents in Sao Paolo (average age at death was 69). The experiment was carefully conducted in a plastic-free environment to avoid any contamination of the brain tissue. The detected particles and fibers corresponded to the most commonly used plastics polymers, especially polypropylene. This study suggests that inhalation of microplastics from the air could be a point of entry of microplastics into the brain. A limitation of this study is that it was only able to identify microplastics; nanoplastics were too small for the instruments used.

A second <u>autopsy study</u> was published as a preprint a few months ago and is currently under peer review. This study used a different spectroscopy method to analyze the presence of microplastics AND nanoplastics in the frontal cortex. Samples came from 27 decedents from 2016 and 24 decedents from 2024, all in New Mexico. The average age at death was 50-52 years. The presence of MNPs was significantly higher in the brain relative to the liver and kidney (the other human tissue sampled) and accounted for 0.5% of the brain tissue by weight. Concerningly, levels of MNPs in the brain were 50% higher in people who died in 2024 compared to those who died in 2016. The most common plastics polymer detected was polyethylene. For more information about my concerns about plastics, you can read this article in **Psychiatric Times** (co-authored with another Maryland psychiatrist, Margo Lauterbach), which also includes strategies to combat plastics pollution.

The other study making the news rounds concerned chemicals leaching into our food. These chemicals usually come from plastics used in industrial food production and packaging. Many of these chemicals have known negative health effects (most concerningly as endocrine disruptors or neurotoxins). The authors conducted a systematic review with the goal of identifying which known food contact chemicals have been identified in human tissue and fluid samples. The FDA is currently reviewing the process of its post-market assessment of chemicals in food and is taking public comments through 12/6.

Medicare Updates

2025 MIPS Virtual Group Election Period

A <u>virtual group</u> is one way clinicians can participate in the <u>traditional Merit-based Incentive Payment System</u> (MIPS). To receive approval to participate as a virtual group for 2025, submit an election e-mail to MIPS <u>VirtualGroups@cms.hhs.gov</u> by December 31, 2024. Click here for more information.

A virtual group <u>must</u> submit an election to CMS for each year it intends to participate in MIPS. If your virtual group was approved and intends to participate in MIPS again as a virtual group in 2025, the group must submit an election to CMS.

A virtual group is a combination of 2 or more Taxpayer Identification Numbers (TINs) consisting of:

- Solo practitioners (defined as the only clinician in a practice) who are <u>MIPS eligible</u>; and/or
- Groups that have 10 or fewer clinicians (at least one clinician within the group must be MIPS eligible).
 A group is considered to be an entire single TIN.

A virtual group has the flexibility to determine its own makeup; a solo practitioner or group can only participate in one virtual group per year. **Benefits of a Virtual Group include c**ollaborating, sharing resources, increasing performance volume to be reliably measured, and potentially increasing performance under MIPS. <u>Click here</u> for more information.

MIPS Extreme and Uncontrollable Circumstances Exceptions

Apply by December 31 for Merit-based Incentive Payment System (MIPS) **Extreme and Uncontrollable Circumstances (EUC) Exceptions for 2024.** Eligible clinicians may apply to reweight any or all MIPS performance categories if they've been affected by EUC, which are defined as rare events entirely outside of your control and the control of the facility in which you practice. These circumstances must:

- Cause you to be unable to collect information necessary to submit for a MIPS performance category;
- Cause you to be unable to submit information that would be used to score a MIPS performance category for an extended period of time (for example, if you were unable to collect data for the quality performance category for 3 months), and/or;
- Impact your normal process, affecting your performance on cost measures and other administrative claims measures.

Apply for MIPS Hardship Exception

Several exception applications are available in 2024 to be exempt from meeting specific Merit-based Incentive Payment System (MIPS) program requirements and reweighting for the final MIPS score. The Quality Payment Program (QPP) automatically assigns special statuses to MIPS eligible clinicians, practices, virtual groups, and APM Entities who meet certain criteria. If you're assigned a special status, your reporting requirements may be affected. (Those already exempt from submitting Promoting Interoperability data don't need to apply. For The deadline to apply for a hardship exception is January 2.

Opioid Treatment Program

In a <u>report</u>, the Office of the Inspector General found that Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) providers didn't always comply with federal requirements when they bill for opioid use disorder (OUD) treatment services, including intake activities. Review <u>OTP Billing & Payment</u>, and learn how to:

- Bill for OUD services
- Use the correct G-codes

MidAtlantic Medicare Part B: FAQs

Be sure to review the MidAtlantic Medicare Part B: FAQs, which are updated quarterly. FAQ topics are created from questions received during webinars, symposiums, and other provider organization meetings attended/hosted by our Provider Outreach & Education staff, as well as questions received from various departments within Novitas. These are reviewed and/or updated each calendar quarter.

The inpatient study includes psychological and cognitive tests, IV medication, and brain scans. Some participants may have the option to complete parts of the study as an outpatient.
