
### **Attention Sheppard Pratt Employees**

### January 14 Council Minutes

Dr. Vidal noted the Council Minutes for the November meeting, the psychopharmacology CME report and the Executive Director's Report were included in the consent agenda. After a few moments of review, Dr. Vidal asked if there were any concerns or comments. Hearing none, the consent agenda was approved unanimously.

#### Support for Strategic Priorities

Dr. Vial provided an update on activities that support MPS Strategic Priorities. She reported that since November the MPS:

- Distributed information on APA Fellowships to RFM members
- Scheduled and advertised MPS Advocacy Day for 2/4/25
- Scheduled RFM trivia night for January
- Held legislative training meeting with WPS members
- Held November CME meeting
- Advertised MPS paper and poster contest to RFM and ECP members
- Planned ethics CME event for winter 2025
- Worked to nominate two residents for the Area 3 RFM award

#### **Executive Committee Report**

Dr. Balis presented the Executive Committee report. She reported that regarding member support, the MPS has published information regarding license renewals, Optum transition updates and more in recent editions of the MPS News. The Executive Committee met with Behavioral Health Administration officials and Meagan Floyd attended and reported back on the Behavioral Health Coalition's meeting with Alyssa Lord. The Executive Committee continues to monitor the unfolding situation at Perkins and sent an email to BHA letting outlining concerns and called for transparency when the report is finalized.

Regarding MPS efforts to unify the voice of psychiatry in Maryland, Dr. Balis noted members of the Executive Committee continue to schedule collaborative meetings with other Maryland stakeholders. In December the MPS signed onto an affordable housing support letter drafted by Health Care for the Homeless. The letter voiced support for preference given to permanent supportive housing (PSH) for households exiting homelessness. The MPS also signed onto a letter from NAMI Maryland in support of the removal of the fail first requirement, and endorsed a letter from the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) supporting the mental health parity and addiction equity act (MHPAEA).

The Executive Committee is developing a new climate psychiatry interest group/committee, members will receive more details, including how to join later this month. She reminded Council that the MPS is hosting Advocacy Day in Annapolis on February 4<sup>th</sup> and encouraged them to attend. She concluded her report by stating that staff is working on closing out the year end accounting to prepare for the CPA review, fourth quarter financials, as well as the CPA's report will be presented at the Council meeting in March.

The February Council meeting will include a 45-minute open membership meeting from 7:30-8:45. This is a time for members to get updates from Committee Chairs, ask questions, etc.

#### Membership Committee Report

Ms. Floyd shared a request for dues relief that was submitted by a current member. After reviewing the request, Council agreed to approve the request, and recommends that APA does the same. Ms. Floyd will notify the member and APA of the Council's decision.

### Nominations and Elections Report

Dr. Hackman presented the proposed 2025 election slate and asked for any additional nominations. Hearing none, Council closed the nominations and voted unanimously in favor of the proposal. Please see <a href="mailto:page 2">page 2</a> for the election slate.

#### **New Business**

A lengthy discussion was held regarding the ongoing challenges of nurse practitioners taking jobs from Maryland psychiatrists. This continues to impact MPS members, and how they practice. Council discussed ways to help the public and legislators become more aware of the vast training differences between the two professions. One continued obstacle is the physician shortage that continues to impact not only the state of Maryland, but the entire US. Dr. Komrad shared the link to a recent article in an AARP publication about the physician shortage, and how it impacts patient care.

#### <u>Adjournment</u>

There being no further business, Council voted to adjourn at 8:25PM.

### Moore-Miller Administration Proposes 2026 Budget

The Moore-Miller Administration released its FY 2026 budget last month which included an increased Medicaid rate for physicians. The budget represents an overall \$67.3 billion operating budget for the State of Maryland. In assembling the FY 2026 budget proposal, however, the Administration had to grapple with a \$3 billion budget deficit.

The State is constitutionally required to pass a balanced budget each year, so the full amount of the \$3 billion budget deficit must be addressed. The Administration's budget proposal is the start of the budget negotiation process and will next be considered by the Maryland General Assembly which can make further additions, cuts, and other changes. Therefore, the Administration's proposals may be significantly altered. The House of Delegates will first consider the budget this year, and the House version will then go to the Senate for further consideration.

MedChi is reviewing the Administration's budget proposal to identify any enhancements or reductions that may impact physicians and patients. We are pleased to report that the Administration's budget restores E&M payment rates to 100% of Medicare. The rates had been reduced to 98% of Medicare in mid-FY 2025.

### CMS Approves Amendment to Maryland HealthChoice

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) approved an amendment to the "Maryland HealthChoice" section 1115 demonstration. Approval of this amendment provides the state authority to establish a reentry demonstration initiative. Under this initiative, the state will provide limited pre-release demonstration coverage to certain incarcerated individuals under Medicaid who have also been assessed and determined to have substance use disorder (SUD), are diagnosed with serious mental illness (SMI), or both, based on specific criteria, for up to 90 days prior to release from state managed prisons and jails. In addition, this approval allows the state to expand the existing Assistance in Community Integration Services (ACIS) pilot program by increasing the number of participant spaces within the program.

This demonstration is effective through December 31, 2026. This <u>amendment</u> and other administrative documents can be found on the <u>Medicaid.gov demonstration page</u>.

### ABA Authorization Request Requirements

Carelon is providing guidance for ABA authorization requests to help expedite approvals. **All** ABA requests require the **ABA Authorization Request Form** to be submitted.

Authorization requests for ABA initial assessments, first-time requests, initial treatments, and concurrent requests all require the following:

- 1. An ABA Authorization Request Form.
- 2. Diagnostic evaluation (CDE) for first time requests to Carelon Behavioral Health. This should be done by a qualified diagnostician (e.g., DO, MD, PsyD, License Clinical Psych or RNP), include the assessment results that led to the diagnosis of ASD, and the diagnostician's signature.
- 3. Recommendation, <u>referral</u>, or prescription (Rx) for ABA participants six (6) months or younger.
- 4. The <u>Continuity of Care form</u> (CCF) provided if the participant is diagnosed before 3 years of age, and it has been more than two years since diagnosis.

In addition to all of the above, authorization requests for ABA initial treatment and concurrent treatment **also require** an **ABA treatment plan** using the provided template. All ABA forms and guides can be found on the <u>Carelon website</u>.

### Maryland News

### Maryland Bills of Interest for MPS Members

The 446th session of the Maryland General Assembly convened in Annapolis on January 8 and will continue through April 7. As of the end of January, more than 1600 pieces of legislation have been filed. The MPS Legislative Committee has been hard at work since December (looking through pre-filed bills) screening bills, preparing testimony, etc. To date the committee has reviewed more than 50 bills. Several bills of interest are noted below.

#### **Support:**

SB 509/HB 592: Prohibited Possession of Firearms - Assisted Outpatient Treatment Respondents: Prohibiting a person from possessing a regulated firearm, rifle, or shotgun if the person is currently a respondent subject to a court order to comply with certain assisted outpatient treatment; and requiring a court to promptly report certain information through a certain data portal if the court orders a person to comply with certain assisted outpatient treatment.

SB 111/HB 382: Maryland Medical Assistance Program and Health Insurance - Step Therapy, Fail-First
Protocols, and Prior Authorization - Prescription to
Treat Serious Mental Illness: Prohibiting the Maryland
Medical Assistance Program and certain insurers, nonprofit health service plans, health maintenance organizations, and managed care organizations from applying a prior authorization requirement, step therapy protocol, or fail-first protocol for prescription drugs used to treat certain mental illnesses of certain insureds and enrollees.

SB328/HB665: Maryland Medical Assistance Program and Health Insurance - Annual Behavioral Health Wellness Visits - Coverage and Reimbursement: An annual behavioral health wellness visit (ABHWV) is an appointment with a medical professional to assess and promote overall well-being. The visit may include a discussion of symptoms, stressors, mood, sleep patterns, substance use, and current life circumstances. The mental health professional may also provide education, coping strategies, and resources to improve mental health and prevent future issues. During the visit, the provider will likely ask questions about the person's current emotional state, stress levels, and behavior patterns. This visit can help individuals identify potential mental health issues early on, allowing for prompt treatment and recovery.

### SB372/HB 869: Preserve Telehealth Access Act of 2025:

Repealing the limitation on the period during which the Maryland Medical Assistance Program and certain insurers, nonprofit health service plans, and health maintenance organizations are required to provide reimbursement for certain health care services provided through telehealth on a certain basis and at a certain rate; etc.

#### Oppose:

SB 90/ HB 195 Criminal Procedure - Incompetency to Stand Trial Dismissal: Altering the time period after which a court is required to dismiss a certain charge against a defendant found incompetent to stand trial under certain circumstances; and requiring a court to provide a certain notice and provide an opportunity to be heard to the State's Attorney and a certain victim or victim's representative before dismissing a certain charge against a defendant found incompetent to stand trial.

HB 312: Criminal Procedure - Incompetency to Stand Trial: This bill aims to alter the time period after which a

court is required to dismiss a certain charge against a defendant found incompetent to stand trial under certain circumstances; and authorizing a victim or victim's representative to petition the court to extend the time for dismissal of certain charges against a defendant found incompetent to stand trial. An alleged (but not proven) victim could petition to keep misdemeanor charges for up to ten years, and it is problematic to have seriously mentally ill defendants sitting in jail while waiting for a hospital bed.



### Member Publications

Sarah Edwards, DO collaborated on an article in *The Journal of Behavioral Health Services & Research* titled "Patient-Level and Hospital Treatment-Level Characteristics Predicting Child Readmissions After Psychiatric Inpatient Treatment," which explores the link between readmissions and different treatment characteristics.

Jimmy Potash, M.D., MPH, Fernando Goes, M.D., and Ray DePaulo, M.D. were authors on a recent paper titled "Genomics yields biological and phenotypic insights into bipolar disorder" published in *Nature*. They identified new genetic factors linked to bipolar disorder, revealing differences based on ancestry and subtype, and highlighting specific cell types involved in the disorder's biology.

### **Members Out & About**

Ken Stoller, M.D. was on a *PBS News Hour* segment "Opioid crisis renews focus on expanding access to methadone treatment." He discussed how relying on a methadone prescription is not enough for people battling opioid addiction and that they benefit from the additional support that clinics often provide to address their social, medical, and mental health needs.

**Cynthia Lewis, M.D.** was awarded the <u>Solomon Carter</u> <u>Fuller Award</u> which honors a Black citizen who has pioneered in an area that has significantly improved the quality of life for Black people. ### **CLIMATE CORNER**

The Maryland General Assembly is in full swing. Below are two environmental bills that could yield important public health benefits.

When talking about environmental health, it is important to recognize that communities that have been politically, economically, and socially excluded typically bear the brunt of the environmental and health harms, whether that be Cancer Alley in Louisiana or Curtis Bay in Baltimore. Senator Lam has introduced CHERISH Act (Cumulative Harms to Environmental Restoration for Improving Shared Health) to address these environmental injustices. Currently, when the Maryland Department of Environment (MDE) approves environmental permits, it only assesses the expected pollution from that company. Unfortunately, we know that structurally marginalized communities already have multiple polluters in their community, and adding a new polluter would increase the cumulative impact on that community. The CHERISH Act requires consideration of the environmental justice score of underserved and overburdened communities in new permit determinations. Ask your legislators to support this bill by filling out this quick action alert.

Transportation is the largest contributor (by sector) to greenhouse gas emissions in Maryland and the United States, partly because of car-centric state and urban planning. Car-centric transit also takes a toll on the environment and human health, as described in a new report written by Healthy Climate Maryland and the Maryland Public Health Association. It emits multiple air pollutants (including carbon dioxide, nitrogen oxide, volatile organic compounds, PM2.5, and microplastics) that cause respiratory and neuropsychiatric harm. It encourages urban sprawl, lessening green spaces, increasing urban heat islands, and limiting opportunities for safe outdoor recreation and physical activity. Thankfully, the Maryland General Assembly wants to address this problem via the Climate and Transportation Alignment Act (HB 84/ SB395), which would require state and regional transportation agencies to mitigate the climate impacts of highway expansion projects costing over \$10 million; mitigation efforts can include expanding public transit, increasing bike infrastructure, expanding broadband access, and placing jobs near communities and transit centers. This bill is inspired by successful legislation in Colorado and Minnesota. Show your support by filling out this action alert—it takes one minute.

### **MIPS Reminders**

**Data Submission:** 2024 Merit-based Incentive Payment System (MIPS) data is being accepted open through April 1. Be sure to sign in at the <u>Quality Payment Program site</u> to submit and review your 2024 data by the deadline.

**2025 Eligibility:** Check whether you're currently required to participate in MIPS by entering your 10-digit National Provider Identifier (NPI) into the <a href="QPP Participation Status Tool">QPP Participation Status Tool</a>. The participation threshold in 2025 remains:

- · Bill more than \$90,000 a year for professional services under Medicare: AND
- · Furnish services to more than 200 Medicare Part B beneficiaries: AND
- · Provide more than 200 services under Medicare.

**2025 Payments:** Last year each participating clinician received a 2023 MIPS score that impacts their Medicare payment in 2025. A positive, neutral, or negative MIPS payment adjustment in 2025 applies if:

- Clinician type is included in MIPS;
- Enrolled in Medicare prior to January 1, 2023;
- **Were not** a Qualifying Alternative Payment Model (APM) Participant;
- Were a Partial Qualifying APM Participant that elected to participate in MIPS; and
- Met one of the following criteria:
  - Individually exceeded the low-volume threshold;
  - Practice exceeded the low-volume threshold at the group level and submitted group or APM data; or
  - Were part of an approved virtual group.
