



Scott Aaronson, MD

Dr. Scott Aaronson is a thought leader in the areas of biological psychiatry, diagnosis, and the integration of somatic and psychological therapies. He is an adjunct professor of psychiatry at the University of Maryland School of Medicine, distinguished life fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, and is a fellow of the American College of Psychiatrists. Dr. Aaronson also serves on the board of the American Society of Clinical Psychopharmacology. He graduated with honors from Harvard Medical School and completed his psychiatric residency at McLean Hospital. Dr. Aaronson is the Chief Science Officer for the newly created Institute for Advanced Diagnostics and Therapeutics at Sheppard Pratt. He has been involved with the development of new strategies to alleviate the symptoms in treatment resistant mood disorders, and has published numerous articles on his research including pivotal studies in the use of devices—Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation (TMS) and Vagus Nerve Stimulation (VNS) in the treatment of severe refractory mood disorders. Most recently, he was named the Director of the Sheppard Pratt Centre of Excellence

focused on the development of uses for psychedelic medications across the spectrum of psychiatric illness. He is currently doing several supported investigator initiated studies to determine the safety and efficacy of psilocybin in severely treatment resistant depression (>4 failures in the current episode), bipolar type 2 depression, depression with suicidal ideation and anorexia.



Dale W. Bratzler, DO, MPH

Dale W. Bratzler, DO, MPH was recently named the Interim Dean of the Hudson College of Public Health. He has served as a Professor and Chair of the Department of Health Administration and Policy at the Hudson College of Public Health, and is a Professor in the Department of Internal Medicine in the College of Medicine at the University of Oklahoma (OU) Health Sciences Center. He assumed the role of Chief COVID Officer for the University of Oklahoma in June of 2020. He also serves as the Chief Quality Officer for the three-hospital health system and faculty practice at OU Health. He has served two terms as president of the American Health Quality Association and was appointed to the National Advisory Council for the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality from 2005 to 2008 by then HHS Secretary Mike Leavitt. He has served on or chaired multiple standing consensus committees for the National Quality Forum. For more than 20 years, Dr. Bratzler has participated in research on prevention of surgical infections and on adult vaccination. He was appointed to the CDC's Healthcare Infection Control Practices

Advisory Committee by then HHS Secretary Kathleen Sebelius and subsequently spent a year as a Senior Policy Advisor for the CDC.



David A. Casey, M.D.

David A. Casey, MD is Professor and John J. and Ruby B. Schwab Endowed Chair in Social, Community, and Family Psychiatry of the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences of the University of Louisville School of Medicine. He is a graduate of the UofL School of Medicine, completed a medical internship at Virginia Mason Hospital in Seattle, and residency in psychiatry at the University of Washington. Dr. Casey received his board certification in general psychiatry in 1988 and certificate of added qualification in geriatric psychiatry in 1991 with recertifications in 2001 and 2011. He is a native Kentuckian, having been born in Leitchfield and raised in Louisville. Dr. Casey has performed research on Alzheimer's Disease, electroconvulsive therapy in the elderly, and elder suicide. He has published more than 50 papers and book chapters, and given over 100 presentations locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally on these and other topics.



Mary Helen Davis, MD, DLFAPA

Mary Helen Davis, MD, DLFAPA, is board certified in Psychiatry, Psychosomatic Medicine and Hospice and Palliative Medicine. She currently is an Associate Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Louisville School of Medicine. She has worked for the past 12 years in PsychoOncology, working in integrated health care settings with medical, surgical and radiation oncologists. She has founded Collaborative Psychosocial Oncology Consults, PLLC, providing consultation and program development strategies for community cancer centers. Currently contracted through Baptist Hospital of Louisville, she has developed an integrated psychosocial oncology program, a geriatric functional assessment for older adults undergoing chemotherapy, Cancer University, a curriculum for patients and caregivers on understanding the cancer experience and journey as well as numerous other programs to meet the needs of cancer patients and providers.



Mary Jo Fitz-Gerald, MD, MBA, DLFAPA, FACP, FACP

Mary Jo Fitz-Gerald, MD is Immediate Past Speaker of the American Psychiatric Association Assembly. She is Gratis Professor of Clinical Psychiatry and Anesthesiology at Louisiana State University Health in Shreveport, La. Clinically, she provides weekend coverage at Ochsner LSU Health Hospital Monroe and is a contract psychiatrist at Caring Choices Clinic in Alexandria, LA. Dr. Fitz-Gerald is a Diplomat of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology and has Added Qualifications in Addiction, Geriatric and Consultation Liaison Psychiatry. She is a Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association, a Fellow of the Academy of Consultation Liaison Psychiatry, and a Fellow of the American College of Psychiatrists. Dr. Fitz-Gerald's awards include: the Allen A. Copping Excellence in Teaching Award from

LSUHS, the Area 7 Association of Academic Psychiatry Teaching Award, the Nancy C.A. Roeske Award of the APA for Excellence in Medical Student Education, the Irma Bland Award of the APA for Excellence in Residency Education, Area V Resident Fellow Mentor Award of the APA, Psychiatrist of the Year of the La. Dr. Fitz-Gerald has previously served the Southern Psychiatric Association as Chair of the Scientific Program Committee and the Resident Research Award. She also served on the PIPE Editorial Board of the American College of Psychiatrists.



Nitin Gogtay, MD

Nitin Gogtay, MD, received his MD from BJ Medical College in India where he also received formal training in pathology and neuropathology. Subsequently, Dr. Gogtay spent several years in basic neuroscience research at Karolinska Institute in Sweden, Sydney University in Australia, and later at National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke, before joining Psychiatry Residency at Cornell. He then joined the Child Psychiatry Branch in 2000 and lead the childhood onset schizophrenia and pediatric brain development projects for the next 15 years. Dr. Gogtay was recruited to develop and lead the NIMH Office of Clinical Research to provides oversight of the clinical trials funded by the NIMH which he lead for about 6 years. Dr. Gogtay joined the APA as Chief, Division of Research and Deputy Medical Director in March 2020. In this role he oversees the development and maintenance of the DSM and also the APA's PsychPRO registry along with several research functions conducted by the Research Division. For the past 6 months, he is also acting as the interim Chief of APA's Division of Education.



Steven Lippman, MD

Steven Lippmann, MD is a retired emeritus professor of psychiatry from the University of Louisville School of Medicine. Now after nearly 4.5 decades there, he remains active with the University and still volunteers regularly in several free medical clinics. He experiences great pleasure in teaching, includes trainees in scientific writing, and mentors foreign medical graduates at gaining residencies. He lives in Louisville Kentucky with his wife, Judy.



Louis J. Marino, MD

Dr. Louis J. Marino is chief of medical staff and medical director of geriatric services at Sheppard Pratt. Prior to joining Sheppard Pratt, he served as chief of geriatric services at Butler Hospital in Providence, RI. Dr. Marino completed his residency and fellowship at University Health Center of Pittsburgh Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic. He earned his MD at State University of New York Health Science Center at Brooklyn. In addition to his clinical work, Dr. Marino is a member of the American Psychiatric Association and the American Association for Geriatric Psychiatry; he is past president of the Rhode Island Psychiatric Society. He serves as a reviewer for *Neurology*, *American Journal of Geriatric Psychiatry*, *American Journal of Medical Genetics*, and the *Journal of Gerontology and Biological Sciences*. Dr. Marino is board certified in both general psychiatry and geriatric psychiatry.



Paul Nestadt, MD

Dr. Nestadt specializes in the evaluation and treatment of anxiety disorders, particularly in behavioral interventions such as exposure-based therapies. Since completing residency, he has served as the primary supervising psychiatrist for the Johns Hopkins Hospital Anxiety Disorders Clinic, seeing patients from all over the US and worldwide for one-time consultations resulting in revised diagnosis and treatment recommendations. He also attends on the inpatient Motivated Behaviors Unit at Johns Hopkins Hospital, where he treats patients suffering from comorbid psychiatric and behavioral crises. Dr. Nestadt's research focuses on the epidemiology of suicide. He is interested in the role of practical factors, such as firearm access and opiate use, in the risk of suicide death. His methodological expertise includes large scale regression based data analysis, post-mortem clinical evaluation, and evaluation of determination of manner of death. He also works with the Doubt/ OCD genetics group and the broader suicide prevention workgroup at Johns Hopkins.



Karin Neufeld, M.D., M.P.H

Dr. Neufeld is the Clinical Director of the Department of Psychiatry and the Director of the Inpatient Psychiatry Consultation Service at the Johns Hopkins Bayview Medical Center. Her areas of clinical and scientific interest include 1) psychosomatic medicine, with a special focus on the measurement, treatment, and prevention of delirium in critically ill populations and in older postoperative patients, and 2) the care and treatment of patients with substance use disorders. Dr. Neufeld chairs the Johns Hopkins Delirium Consortium - a multi-discipline and multi-campus collaboration that meets monthly to foster delirium research within the Johns Hopkins Medical Institution. She is a Past President of the American Delirium Society, an organization dedicated to the advancement of delirium science. As a delirium expert, she has served on the American Geriatrics Society Guideline Panel for the Treatment and Prevention of Postoperative Delirium in Older Adults and on the Society for Critical Care Medicine Expert Panel's most recent publication of the Pain, Agitation, Delirium and Early Mobility Guidelines for the Intensive Care Unit.



Deepak Prabhakar, MD, MPH

Deepak Prabhakar, MD, MPH is chief of medical staff at Sheppard Pratt. Dr. Prabhakar is board certified in general psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry. His research interests include depression, suicide and health disparities. Dr. Prabhakar specializes in sports psychiatry and he works with athletes across the age spectrum and at all levels of competition. Dr. Prabhakar is past president of the Michigan Council of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry. In 2020, Dr. Prabhakar received *Baltimore Business Journal's* Leaders in Healthcare award for his work with the Virtual Psychiatric Urgent Care that Sheppard Pratt launched during COVID to help meet the needs of those with mental illness in the midst of disruptions caused by the pandemic. Dr. Prabhakar serves as the Editor-in-Chief of Elsevier's *Advances in Psychiatry and Behavioral Health*. He has presented nationally and internationally at the annual meetings of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (AACAP), The American Association of Directors of Psychiatric Residency Training (AADPRT), Association

for Academic Psychiatry (AAP), American Hospital Association (AHA), American Psychiatric Association (APA), and the World Psychiatric Association-Epidemiology (WPA).



Todd Peters, MD, FAPA

Dr. Peters completed his residency in General Psychiatry and fellowship in Child and Adolescent Psychiatry at Brown University. He joined Sheppard Pratt Health System to become the Medical Director of Child and Adolescent Services and Chief Medical Information Officer (CMIO) in July 2018. He was promoted to Vice President and Chief Medical Officer (CMO) in July 2019. He is also an Adjunct Associate Professor in the Department of Psychiatry at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. Previously he had worked at Vanderbilt University Medical Center from 2011-2018, where he served as the Inpatient Medical Director at Vanderbilt Psychiatric Hospital and Assistant CMIO for Vanderbilt University Medical Center prior to his departure. Clinically, Dr. Peters has worked as a hospitalist on the Adolescent Inpatient Units at Sheppard Pratt Hospital in Towson, MD. He has also practiced as an electroconvulsive therapy (ECT) provider. As an educator, he has been actively involved in teaching residents, fellows, and medical students since residency. He has also made numerous presentations at national meetings on child and adolescent psychiatric care and on medical informatics in behavioral healthcare. Dr. Peters is a Distinguished Fellow of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (AACAP) and as a Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association (APA). He has served as the Chair for AACAP's Committee for Health Information Technology since 2018 and has been a representative for the AACAP's Committee on Healthcare Access and Economics since 2009. He has served as the Consulting Editor for the Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Clinics of North America from 2017-2021.



Monica Rettenmier, MD

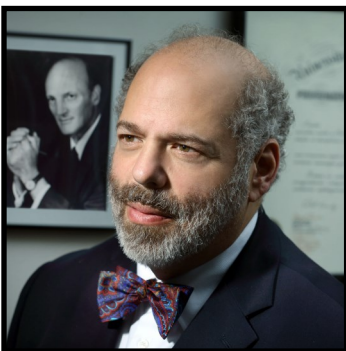
Dr. Monica Rettenmier is board certified in both child/adolescent and adult psychiatry. She is the service chief of the Electroconvulsive Therapy department at Sheppard Pratt. Her areas of interest include primary mood disorders, including treatment resistant unipolar and bipolar depression, as well as anxiety disorders, in both adult and pediatric populations. Dr. Rettenmier is trained in the Neuromodulation areas of electroconvulsive therapy (ECT) and transcranial magnetic stimulation (TMS). She also works as a staff child/adolescent psychiatrist in the Telehealth Outpatient Services of Sheppard Pratt. Before this role, she worked as a staff psychiatrist in the Child/Adolescent Partial Hospitalization Program of Sheppard Pratt, providing care to children and adolescents in an acute care setting. She has training in cognitive behavioral therapy (CBT), dialectal behavior therapy (DBT), and trauma-informed care for both individuals and families who have experienced traumatic events. During her child/adolescent fellowship, she worked with the Vanderbilt Center of Excellence for Children in State Custody, providing diagnostic evaluations and recommendations for children and adolescents struggling with complex psychiatric and psychosocial presentations.

She works with all age ranges, from young children to geriatric patients. She also enjoys teaching others about mental health from the individual who is suffering, to the family that supports them, as well as the trainees who will care for them in the future.



Julia Riddle, MD

Dr. Riddle graduated from Johns Hopkins School of Medicine and completed her psychiatry residency at Johns Hopkins, serving as Chief Resident in her final year. She is now in a two-year clinical and research fellowship in reproductive psychiatry at the Women's Mood Disorders Center. She specializes in mood and anxiety disorders throughout the reproductive years. Prior to medical school, Dr. Riddle worked in services research at the University of Maryland. She also holds a 200 ton Yachtmaster license.



Glenn Treisman, MD

Dr. Glenn Treisman is the Eugene Meyer III Professor of Psychiatry and Medicine at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. He is Director of the AIDS Psychiatry Service, The Pain Treatment Program, and his most-recent effort as co-director of the Amos Center, a program that studies atypical GI disorders and the relationship between food, the nervous system of the GI tract, the microbiome, and disease. The Pain treatment Program provides care for chronic pain syndromes and is a national referral resource for patients with intractable pain. He is best known for his groundbreaking work in the field of HIV, where he has been described as "the father of AIDS psychiatry." He is involved in the care of psychiatrically ill HIV infected patients and has been since early in the epidemic. He described and has raised awareness of the role of mental illness as a driving force in the HIV epidemic as well as a barrier to effective care. He is the author of *The Psychiatry of AIDS*, the first comprehensive textbook on the subject, as well as numerous articles on the issues of mental health in the HIV clinic.



Andrew Tuck, MD

Dr. Tuck is PGY-4 in Psychiatry at Duke University Medical Center. Originally from Michigan, he moved to New York City for medical school at Columbia University, where he engaged in a variety of psychiatric research projects and developed his current interests in forensics, addiction, and public psychiatry (especially the state hospital system). He has continued to pursue these interests since starting residency at Duke in 2019. He recently started a 2-year fellowship in the APA Edwin Valdiserri Correctional Public Psychiatry Fellowship. After graduating residency Dr. Tuck plans to work in an academic setting focusing on the treatment of individuals with serious and persistent mental illness.



Carol Vidal, MD, Ph.D.

Dr. Carol Vidal is a child and adolescent psychiatrist and Assistant Professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences at the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. She works clinically in a School-based mental health program located in Baltimore City Schools where she evaluates and treats children and adolescents with behavioral and depressive disorders. Dr. Vidal was awarded the K12 American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry Physician Scientist Program in Substance Abuse to study the associations between cannabis use and suicide in adolescents, and is the co-principal investigator in a Johns Hopkins Consortium School-Based Health Solutions grant to implement a substance use screening, intervention and referral program in the school setting. She earned her M.D. and PhD from the School of Medicine of the Universitat Autònoma de Barcelona and her MPH from Drexel University in Philadelphia. She completed her residency in general psychiatry and her fellowship in child and adolescent psychiatry at the University of Maryland in Baltimore.



James West, M.D.

Dr. West is Associate Professor of Psychiatry and a Scientist at the Center for the Study of Traumatic Stress, Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences. He earned his Bachelor of Science in Engineering from the U.S. Naval Academy and his M.D. from the University of Michigan Medical School. Dr. West is board-certified in psychiatry and a distinguished fellow of the American Psychiatric Association. He served as an embedded Navy psychiatrist in support of the Marine Corps in Iraq and Afghanistan. His professional interests include promoting discussions about safer storage of firearms, sustaining the resilience of disaster workers and promoting embedded systems of care, and translating understanding of the biological underpinnings of PTSD into more effective treatments.
